Mona's story



Mona first visited Lancashire Archives in 1940s' wartime when she was still at school. She was passionate about history and excited about being able to touch and read the documents which brought the past to life. This led to a lifelong interest in local history and in 1986 Mona was one of the first members of the new Friends of Lancashire Archives.

She joined the committee and enthusiastically raised funds to support the FLA in caring for the archive collections, which provided information and evidence for her own research and writing. Mona published books and articles on the history of Ormskirk and district; her work using the archives revealed new aspects to the past. Over the years Mona recognised how her membership of the Friends supported the preservation of Lancashire's archives and wanted this to continue when she was no longer around, so she decided to leave a legacy in her will.

Mona died in January 2014 and her bequest has unlocked other money, allowing the Friends to fund the cataloguing and repackaging of an archive collection. This will be a lasting memorial to her, ensuring that the material is preserved and that it can be made available for future generations to enjoy.

Ross Duggan, Mona's son, says:

My mother was a keen supporter of the Archive for many decades, both as a volunteer and as a researcher. She started her local history as a schoolgirl and finished as a PhD! It is very appropriate that her support should continue after her death through her bequest. It is heart-warming to know that she is remembered and that her influence remains with us through her assistance for those who follow.
